## Sig Tau Ryan Hamlin (P'05,G'07) Going for Olympic Gold! by Ryan Hamlin

Does sliding down a mountain at 70+ miles an hour sound fun? It is, especially on a sled with your face just inches from the ice. It's called Skeleton, and yes it is a sport (<u>http://www.skeletonsport.com/history/</u>). Top athletes perform on both the World Cup and Olympic stages. This past winter I was blessed with the opportunity to follow one of my dreams, one shared with my sister Erin...Olympic Competition. She fulfilled hers back in 2006 at the Winter Olympics in Torino, Italy (<u>www.hamlin-luge.com</u>), now my journey is just beginning.

In December, I was named to the U.S. National Development Team for Skeleton. After my first full sliding season I achieved an 8<sup>th</sup> place ranking (third among first year sliders), and was told I had "the stuff" or natural driving ability to be competitive internationally. Currently, I am working and training both at home and in Lake Placid, NY.

As with any Olympic Sport, an athlete must maintain amateur status, thus posing a financial mountain to climb, particularly for Skeleton athletes who are responsible for their own equipment and training costs (top of the line sleds cost \$10,000). Family and friends have been very supportive in helping me achieve my goals thus far. To continue my goal of competing in the Olympics I ask you to take a look at the Amateur Athletic Training Fund (ATF) put in place by the United States Bobsled and Skeleton Federation (www.usbsf.com). The ATF allows for tax-deductible donations or gifts to be placed in a fund strictly to help offset the costs of training and equipment without compromising amateur status. I have attached an official statement from the USBSF regarding the ATF.



This would be greatly appreciated, and I am more than willing to answer any questions anyone may have. If anyone is considering helping me out you can contact me at <a href="mailto:ryan.j.hamlin@gmail.com">ryan.j.hamlin@gmail.com</a>, or if you happen to find yourself in Lake Placid during the months of Oct-March and want to check out the track etc. don't hesitate to get a hold of me, I also should be in the Alumni Database. In addition, The World Championships for Luge, Bobsled and Skeleton are all in Lake Placid in 2009, (my sister will be competing in Luge) if you have never seen a sliding sport in person this is a perfect and awesome opportunity to do so.

#### How to Help Ryan and His Team Mates Reach Their Olympic Goal:

#### US BOBSLED & SKELETON FEDERATION

#### AMATEUR ATHLETE TRAINING FUND

#### Overview

The United States Bobsled & Skeleton Federation is pleased to offer the Amateur Athlete Training Fund (ATF) to help offset the training expenses of its athletes. Sponsors and donors may send donations to the ATF to benefit the general athlete pool, or a specific purpose. However, the USBSF maintains discretionary use of these funds if an athlete retires, is suspended, or leaves the sport. Additionally, in order to receive reimbursement of expenses through the ATF, the athlete must demonstrate the desire to participate and continue to participate in the sport of bobsled or skeleton. Attached is a list of qualifying expenses that athletes use as a guide to access these funds. The USBSF will reimburse athletes upon receipt of qualifying expense reports.

The ATF is intended to provide incentive for individual athletes to develop sponsorship to cover their individual bobsled and skeleton training needs while maintaining their amateur eligibility status.

Under joint supervision of the USBSF Finance Manager and Chief Executive Officer, the following general procedures will be observed.

The athlete, and the Chief Executive Officer's designate, will communicate regarding the specific dispersals from his/her training fund. The budget and audit committee of the USBSF will make final decisions with regards to any questionable expenditure.

#### **USBSF** Discretion

If an athlete helps to solicit donations to this fund, we will make every effort to assist that athlete in qualifying for those funds with the following exception:

Any remaining funds in an athlete's account upon his/her retirement, suspension, or death will be used to assist other active athletes. An athlete will be considered to be retired if he/she does not slide for one entire season, and has not sent a letter to the USBSF expressing his/her intent to slide in a subsequent season.

#### **Funding Allocations**

100% of donated/gifted funds are available to athletes.

#### Gifts vs. Donations

Funds provided to athletes who do not qualify as "donations" for the ATF are considered to be gifts from the donor to the athlete. Gifts should be made payable directly to the athletes rather than gifting through the Athletic Training Fund.

If the sponsorship funds are to be classified as a "gift", the sponsor will <u>not</u> receive credit for a tax-deductible donation. In this scenario, the USBSF will <u>not</u> need to report your income to the IRS.

The USBSF will assume all sponsorship funds received are "donations", except in the following three specific cases:

A sponsorship will be considered a "gift" if the sponsor sends a letter with the donation specifically stating the sponsorship is a "gift".

A sponsorship will be considered a "gift" if the USBSF is aware of any familial relationship between the donor and donee, regardless of intent by the donor.

A sponsorship will be considered a "gift" if the athlete's name appears anywhere on the check (even in the memo section).

If the sponsorship funds are classified as a "donation", the sponsor may take credit for a tax-deductible donation as IRS rules permit. In this scenario, if the athlete subsequently accesses \$600 or more from those "donated" funds from his/her account during any calendar year, the USBSF will issue a 1099-MISC to the athlete by January 31 of the following year, meaning the athlete's income for the previous calendar year will be reported to the Internal Revenue Service. From there, it will be the athlete's responsibility to report this income on their annual tax return. The USBSF does not offer tax advice and donors and athletes should consult a tax advisor.

If you wish to make a <u>tax-deductible donation to specifically go to Ryan Hamlin's training fund</u>, make the check out the USBSF and then specify who the funds are for in a letter. Ryan's name can't appear on the check to be eligible for a tax-deductible donation. You can mail the check to Ryan and he will deposit in his AFT. His address is:

# A Letter from Cofounder Tom DeBello (Cofounder '63, G'65)

Dear Chuck,

It's been a long time since I graduated from Geneseo, and was an active Sig Tau member. I won't go on and on about the old days, save that experience for a drink or two at the Big Tree Inn.

After I left Geneseo I spent a year at graduate school in Binghamton where I studied Anthropology and met the love of my life. But being young and thinking that there's time for everything, I took off after a year and joined the Peace Corps. I was sent to the island of Mindanao, in the Philippines where I was an ESL teacher. I hadn't wanted to be a teacher, I didn't have a teaching degree, and I may have been in the first or second class at Geneseo to have a BA that wasn't in teaching. But somehow I took to it and really enjoyed it.

When I got back to States I was hired as a junior high school social studies teacher, married Pat, now my wife of 39 years, and began a family in Smithtown, Long Island. Pat worked in Sachem School District as a school social worker, and volunteered at the Salvation Army. Some of you may remember **Tim Clouser** and **Merilee Richardson**, then his wife. We credit Tim, who taught and coached in Sachem for steering Pat in that direction.

Over the years our family grew, Tom Jr. my oldest is now 35 and a social worker; Damian the next oldest is 31, works for Merrill Lynch, and married to Nicole a lawyer (they are our family's "Mahattanites"); Nick is 29, also a social worker, and Gabrielle is 28 (a social studies teacher – there had to be one!) and married to Seth Meier (an art teacher and a DK, but we like him anyway). Kathe Sheehan (G'67) reports that her late husband's namesake and grand


