Homecoming 2003 a bunch of us got together. We were old men who use to be college guys, guys I once considered brothers. Phil Connery (Pledged spring '80, Class of '83)....The offices I held include master of ritual and president.


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sorority house soon. Basher was/is a great guy, and fellow Sig Tau, FYI.

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

In this role I was an officer of a financially troubled insurance company which we sold after a successful turnaround and then SVP of an insurance group (the last piece of Xerox Financial Services) which we sold after our attempted LBO went south. Next up was EVP/COO of a consulting company based in Chicago from which I was drafted by a customer to be an officer/investor in a venture capital-backed start-up company in automotive parts manufacturing, on to another automotive company and lastly as an officer of Lone Star Steel subsequently sold to US Steel - took buyout and retired. Came out of retirement to run a failing YMCA for three years, retired again and have recently started part-time with a Credit Union doing staff and organizational development.

Married twice, three kids, I still have my own teeth and



hair plus about 75 pounds.





Whatever Happened to the Sig Tau Follies?

The Sig Tau Follies (Zieg Tau Follies) were a yearly event held every fall, originally at the Riviera Theater on Center Street and later in Wadsworth Auditorium on campus. A creation of **Bruce Jordan (Founder '63, Class of '66),** the Follies was a musical variety show in which only the brothers performed. The Follies were a spoof on the Vaudeville era of the 1920's. The first Follies were held on



Saturday, December 12, 1964. It featured such skits as Torche La Phlegm, Norma Vincent Peele, and Mamie Neal. See picture below. {Jack Sheehan (Founder '63, Class of '66) as Master of



the fraternity. The fund was used to pay high school tuition for a Philippine student each year. After eleven years, the College had enough of the Follies, and refused to allow the event held in Wadsworth Auditorium. Whatever Happened to the Sig Tau Junkyard Regatta?

The first Regatta was held on May 16, 1964. Contestants were required to race the length of Hemp Pond on a craft which they made themselves. Rules stated that the craft could be anything but a boat or a canoe, to be crewed by no less than two and no more than 15 people. Before taking off, contests drank a set amount of beer or soda (soda became allowed when they rose the drinking age to 21), and during the race a certain amount was consumed. During the course of the event, it often turned into a demolition derby. Contestants came



up with many interesting devices with which to eliminate the competition. In the 1972 Regatta (see picture below), for example, Sig Tau brothers sailed to victory with a raft equipped with a six-foot rapid fire sling, capable of accurately firing an empty beer can 100 yards. The competition didn't get near their raft that year. The Regatta was a very popular event and regularly drew crowds of over 800 spectators. The success was partly due to the fact that teams from every fraternity and sorority and the dorms were accepted. It was an opportunity for everyone on campus to come together for a very unique event.

The last Regatta was held in 1978. The following winter, an ice storm knocked a number of trees into the pond, leaving it not able to navigate. Brothers spent a weekend in the spring of 1979 clearing the trees from the pond with chain saws and pulleys, but the event was not held again. {From Chronicle of Sigma Tau Psi: A History of the Fraternity, Published 1997, Editor Brian M. A Recollection by Tom "Moonzo" Mooney

The pictured winning raft was an alumni entry by the brothers of the class of '71 (of which I was a proud member). There had been some minor acts of piracy in the previous year Regatta, so we built our ship fully prepared for any such encounters on the high seas. Our barrels were attached on the morn of the race with steel cable....all framing done with 2 - by lumber. Crewman **Troskosky** (unfortunately not shown in the image - I think he took the photo) had his BOCES students build a 5 foot mounted slingshot capable of propelling an empty beer can up to 50 yards, and all crew were armed with hockey sticks... Aye, there would be no unauthorized boarding of THIS vessel on THIS



day! She was in no way built for speed, indeed her deck with crew and several cases of beer aboard stayed barely above the water line!! She was built to endure and endure she did. From the start of the race we systematically destroyed and sank the completion one by one... First with beer can shelling volleys from the giant slingshot, then hand to hand combat. The other surviving raft was captained by Brother **Eddy Mace** (**Pledged '70, Class of '74).** He is pictured in the photo, for some reason, floating harmlessly in a drunken stupor in the inner

tube just behind us? The obvious fact that he and his dismounted craft presented no threat to our victory was probably the reason his vessel was not ravaged with the others. The crew in the

foreground from left to right is brothers **Tom Wega (Pledged '69, Class of '71), Tom Mooney (Pledged '68, Class of '71), Doug Dixon (Pledged '68, Class of '71) and Mike Kohlhas (Pledged '70, Class of '72).** Standing on the raft with his back to the camera is **"Mean Captain Johnny Berry"** a longtime friend and ally of the '71 ETs. He provided us with the steel cable and hockey sticks. The remains of the mounted slingshot are clearly visible on the starboard bow. Perhaps the violence of this day had something to do with the end of the annual Regatta? I'm not sure, but it was an ET memory I will always cherish and remember... It was no doubt the greatest naval battle ever fought in the Genesee Valley. IT was... a great day at sea!!!! (Picture: Victory at the Finish Line)

I was a member of the pledge class of 1969 and graduated from Geneseo in 1971. I spent one year in the dorm, which I believe was a requirement of incoming freshman, then stayed in various apartments both in and around the village, including one over Pontillo's Pizza Shop and one at the Beetle Bailey farm house. Tim Lyons and I shared a place in Mt. Morris in the fall of '69, and he and I watched the first Monday Night Football Game on a little TV set at the end of the bar at the bowling alley on Main Street. Right around the corner was the Idle Hour and across the street from there was the liquor store, conveniently located next to the movie theater. The other liquor store was on the outskirts of the village, and was owned by none other than former Yankee pitcher Vic Raschi, "The Springfield Rifle." Ted Williams noted often that Vic was the toughest right hander he ever faced. I interviewed Mr. Raschi several times for a journalism course I was taking and found him to be very

accommodating despite his gruff exterior. I also interviewed Rod Serling, creator of "The Twilight Zone," at the Big Tree Inn one afternoon. He was speaking later that evening as a guest of the Theater Department, but that didn't stop him from consuming several martinis once he discovered that our visit was on the university's dime. I did not make it to the lecture. As part of a music course I was taking, I saw Ravi Shankar perform and remember being mesmerized by his deft playing of the sitar. I guess The Beatles liked it, too.

My principle motivation for rushing Sig Tau was to play on their intramural sports teams. As a freshman, I played on a dorm team that beat the Phigs in flag football and that attracted some Greek attention. Several guys on that team became Sig Taus and, if memory serves, won the triple crown

during the '70-'71 intramural season. I also recall driving Beetle's farm truck as our float in the Homecoming parade, until the engine began smoking uncontrollably, and we had to pull it off on a side street. There might have been beer involved. As with all the Old Guard, I also have fond but somewhat fuzzy memories of Final Bids Night, the White Rose Ball, The Genny Awards, The Regatta, The White Elephant Sale, etc. Good times.

Personally, following graduation Susie Bradt (Clio) and I were married and settled in Camden, NY, where we taught, coached, volunteered and raised our family for 33 years, retiring in 2004. In 2005 we bought our dream house, a log home, on a little piece of land in Madison County. Sadly, Susie contracted cancer in 2009 and was taken from me after 40+ wonderful years of marriage in 2012. Some of you might remember her as our White Rose Queen in 1970. Our only child, son Zack, inherited my love of journalism and is now an editor and consultant for several small newspapers in Eugene, OR, as well as a part time sports reporter for that city's Register-Guard.

My principle interests continue to involve the outdoors, whether it is the maintenance of this little farm, bird hunting and the dog training that is a large part of it, fly fishing and skeet shooting. I am an avid sports fan and can often be found at the Carrier Dome whether it be for football, basketball or lacrosse.
